Can I understand different word classes?

What are word classes?

We can group words into different word classes according to how they are used in the sentence.

The word classes are noun, verb, adjective, adverb, preposition, determiner, pronoun and conjunction.

'before' is a word with multiple uses.

In the first sentence, before is used at the start of a phrase (before the end of the match) so it is a preposition.

In the second sentence, 'before' is used to start a subordinate clause (before you turn left) so it is a conjunction.

I see her every day, standing outside her flat.

Some words that can be either determiners or pronouns, depending how they are used in the sentence.

If the word is used before a noun, it is a determiner. (her flat)

If the word replaces a noun (name) it is a pronoun. (I see her)
