Varying sentence openers:

Using adverbs (how)

<u>Victoriously</u>, Charlie emerged from the undergrowth.

Using prepositions (where)

Connective opener (when)

Last thing at night.

The darkness <u>enveloped him like a blan-</u>
<u>ket</u>, as he crept through the
tunnel.

'ing' opener

Tim, <u>hoping</u> for silence, snuck into the staffroom.

'ed' opener

Exhausted by the race, Tim slumped to the ground.
